8	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Good morning and welcome
9	to this meeting of the Washington State Redistricting
10	Commission. My name is Lura Powell, and I'm chairman
11	of the Commission.
12	And I would like to have folks up here on the dais
13	go down and introduce each of themselves.
14	Bonnie?
15	MS. BUNNING: I'm Bonnie Bunning, and I'm the
16	executive director for the Commission.
17	MR. FALLIS: I'm Rusty Fallis with the
18	Attorney General's Office. I'm general counsel to the
19	Commission.
20	COMM. GORTON: Slade Gorton, commissioner
21	appointed by Senate Republicans.
22	COMM. CEIS: Tim Ceis, appointed by the
23	Senate Democrats.
24	MS. O'SULLIVAN: Genevieve O'Sullivan,
25	communications director for the Commission.

1	COMM. HUFF: Tom Huff, appointed by the House
2	Republicans.
3	COMM. FOSTER: I'm Dean Foster, and I was
4	appointed by the House Democrats.
5	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. Thank you.
6	Our first order of business is approval of the
7	minutes of November 8 th . It was sort of a quick
8	turnaround. But have you all had a chance to look at
9	the the minutes? And if so, let me know if there
10	are any additions or corrections.
11	COMM. FOSTER: I move they be approved.
12	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. It's been moved
13	that the minutes be approved. Do I have any further
14	discussion?
15	Okay. All those in favor say "aye."
16	COMMISSION MEMBERS: Aye.
17	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Opposed? Okay. We have
18	minutes.
19	Okay. The next item of business is Matters
20	Pertaining to Redistricting. And I would like to ask
21	the other commissioners if they have any reports to
22	make.
23	COMM. GORTON: Tim?
24	COMM. CEIS: Sure. Yeah. So the the
25	Senate representatives have met on three different

occasions, I think, to discuss the northwest part of the state, Districts 42, 40, 38, 10, 39, 32, 21, and 1. Did I leave anybody out?

COMM. GORTON: 44 did you say?

COMM. CEIS: 44. Thank you. I do not want to forget the 44th.

I think we made really very significant progress.

We have some -- still a little bit of work to do. But

I think the progress was very significant, and, in

fact, so significant I think we're ready to discuss our

next group of districts we might want to take on.

COMM. GORTON: Yes. Madam Chairman, I agree. We took that assignment that came up at last week and did the best job we could at reconciling the two plans that the Democratic commissioners and Republican commissioners had come up with. And while there's still a bit of work left, I think we're a long way there. And I second what Tim has said, that we're willing -- we're -- we're ready to take on the next set south because, of course, that affects the south end of what we've already done and is one of the things still remaining and work on that this week.

COMM. CEIS: And as always, it's still a work-in-progress.

COMM. GORTON: It's a work-in-progress, and

1 nothing's final till everything's final. But we're 2 quite encouraged. 3 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. How about the two of you? 4 5 COMM. HUFF: Dean and I have met four times, 6 I guess. And, you know, it's interesting when you're 7 working with this much detail that it takes a while to 8 work out some of the technical issues, which -- we 9 fortunately have done that, and we made overall quite 10 good progress. And we, too, are continuing to meet to 11 see if we can get this all buttoned up in the next few 12 days and then move on into the next regional section 13 that we're discussing. And we'll bring that up a little bit later. 14 COMM. FOSTER: I have nothing to add to that 15 16 report. I agree. CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. So it sounds like 17 18 we're ready to talk about the next pieces that you all 19 want to add to your list. 20 COMM. CEIS: Yeah. I think that would be the 21 next step 'cause --22 COMM. GORTON: Yeah. 23 COMM. CEIS: -- I think we're both saying 24 we're ready to go to work on the next groupings, that 25 we should identify which those are going to be.

1	I mean, for us it would make sense for us to
2	continue to go south from where we left off, as as
3	Commissioner Gorton said, and probably to start coming
4	down the east side of Lake Washington.
5	COMM. GORTON: Or both sides of Lake
6	Washington.

Depends on how much progress we make again and what 9 10 we're ready to present. 11 COMM. GORTON: Yeah. 12 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. What's your --13 what are your thoughts on the congressional and taking a look at that? Because it just -- it just seems to me 14 15 that you're almost -- it'd be easier -- maybe that's a naïve thought on my part -- to, you know, sort of --16 COMM. GORTON: To draw 10 rather than 49? 17 18 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Huh? 19 COMM. GORTON: To draw 10 rather than 49? 20 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Yes. And, you know, 21 some -- I mean, some of the -- the issues will be 22 different, obviously, but some of them may have similar 23 connotations. So . . . 24 COMM. FOSTER: Well, I think we're all 25 thinking legislative right now. And we shouldn't

interrupt that pattern. And we still have two -- two sections of the state to do, even after we've divvied up our second round of assignments. And we'll get to congressional.

CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Well, I mean, any thoughts?

I mean, I guess one of the things that I -- if things move along real quickly on the legislative -- and I'm hoping they will -- I think that's great. I just was thinking that if indeed it's going to be a slower process, it might be good if the congressional could be considered a little bit earlier. At least then we have something out before the public that they can be taking a look at.

COMM. GORTON: Well, of course, that's the whole -- was our whole reason for a November goal.

So -- you know, so that there would be a gap. As my fellow commissioners know, I would have liked to have done congressional first. The others don't. And now we're on legislative, and we're making progress on it, and I think it probably ought to have priority.

COMM. HUFF: Well, I would tend to agree because right now we have got 49 districts that are a pretty full plate to be dealing with. And the congressional, of course, I think, is another plate

that we need to deal with. And I don't know if we 1 2 would necessarily want to have both plates on the table 3 at the same time. So I tend to think that we're on the right course of doing the legislative and -- and making 4 5 progress and getting that out of the way and then -and then doing the congressional. But time will tell, 6 7 I guess. 8 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Yeah. Well. as long as 9 we're making good progress, I think that that will 10 work. 11 COMM. CEIS: And we -- you know, we still 12 have not agreed to what the process for dealing with 13 the congressional map is going to be. So I don't think 14 we can assume it's this same process. So we're going 15 to have to have some discussion of that, as well. 16 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Yeah. 17 COMM. CEIS: I just agree with all the other commissioners. We're focused on the legislative map. 18 19 It's making some progress, pretty good progress. I think we should stick with it. 20 21 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. Well, you can just 22 keep it -- noodling on it in the back of your minds. 23 COMM. GORTON: Okay. COMM. CEIS: Never far from our minds. 24 25 CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: That's good to hear.

1	COMM. HUFF: I put it under my pillow every
2	night.
3	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: That's good.
4	Redistricting version of the Tooth Fairy will come and
5	deliver you a plan.
6	COMM. FOSTER: And I'd be happy to call you
7	in the middle of the night when I wake up thinking
8	about this if you'd like a a nightly report. I
9	don't usually start till 4:00.
10	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Oh, that's good, Dean.
11	COMM. FOSTER: Yeah.
12	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: I'll just wait.
13	Okay. Is there are there any other matters
14	that anyone would like to have considered at this time
15	or talk about?
16	Okay. So you ready to get back to work?
17	COMM. GORTON: Yes.
18	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Good. Okay. Any
19	other
20	Okay. Let's we just have one person signed up
21	for public comment today, and that is John Milem.
22	So, John, if you'd like to come forward.
23	Oh, yeah. I do have a couple of comments, also,
24	on the Web, but I'll cover them after.
25	Go ahead, John. You can start.

MR. MILEM: My name is John Milem, J-o-h-n M-i-l-e-m. I live in Vancouver, and I am an advocate for redistricting in the public interest.

I have today for you the beginning of my analysis on the legislative -- on the legislative plans that you've offered -- that is not the four individual plans but the two plans offered by the pairs of commissioners -- comparing those with mine. And basically it's the same song, just another verse.

There are provisions in the state constitution and in the state redistricting statute that are intended to discipline this process. And I would just like to encourage you to comply with them.

Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Thank you.

And we have two comments online. And one is from Chad Lupkes. And his -- he says, (as read) "My comment on whether the Commission should address the CD plans is that once the LD plans are completed it might be easier to create the Congressional Districts based on those lines."

And one came from Amanda Taub, who said, "Douglas County is almost ready to comment on the Legislative plans for Districts 12 and 13. We are anxious to see the 2 options for the Congressional plans." So . . .

1	COMM. CEIS: (Indiscernible).
2	COMM. GORTON: Yes.
3	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: And that's that's it.
4	COMM. FOSTER: With regard to that first
5	comment, of course, we're we have 49 legislative
6	districts and 10 congressional districts, and you just
7	can't draw 'em by legislative lines. When we had seven
8	legis congressional districts, that was done that
9	way. But it it's pretty difficult now to
10	superimpose congressional lines on legislative lines.
11	He's got in other states where where it
12	evens up, I think that probably happens, but
13	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Uh-huh.
14	COMM. CEIS: I would also I thought I
15	heard that correctly. They're just getting ready to
16	comment on the legislative plans from Douglas County's
17	perspective? Is that what they said?
18	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Yes.
19	COMM. CEIS: I would encourage them to hurry
20	up. We're moving quickly to that area.
21	CHAIRWOMAN POWELL: Okay. I think that's it
22	for our public comment.
23	Are there any other issues to come before the
24	Commission today?
25	COMM. HUFF: We're planning on having meeting
